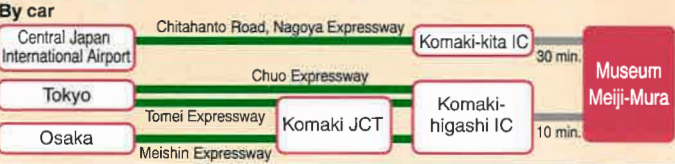
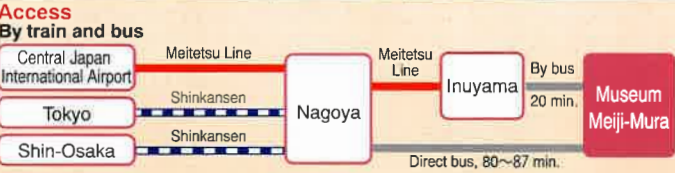

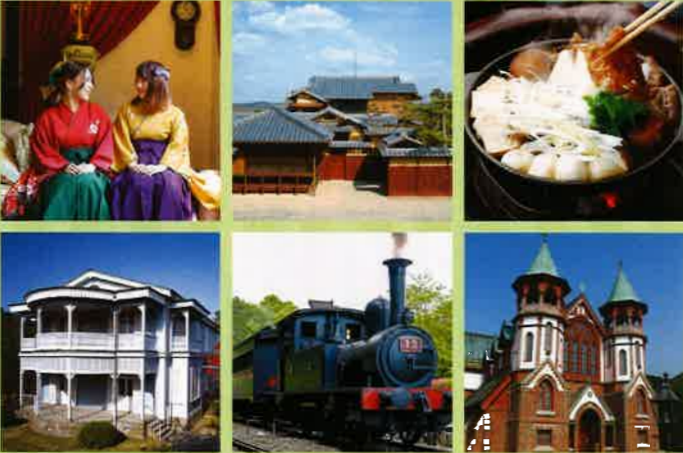

• Museum Meiji-Mura

Meiji period (1868-1912)

This revolutionary period brought an end to a society dominated by the warrior class. The previous stable period of feudal rule had endured for almost two centuries, during which interaction with other countries was severely restricted. In every field, Meiji people actively adopted advanced technologies and institutions based on European and American models. As modernization proceeded, the new ways fused with Japanese traditions.

Museum Meiji-Mura

One of the world's largest open-air museums, Meiji-Mura is devoted to the Meiji period, which started over 110 years ago -- the time when the modernization of Japan began. The idea was to collect valuable buildings and other historical artifacts that would otherwise be destroyed, so that they can continue to be enjoyed by future generations. Reconstructed here, the buildings demonstrate the great advances and significance of the Meiji period. In Meiji-Mura, in addition to visiting historical buildings and viewing exhibits, by wearing period costumes and riding period transportation, you can almost travel back in time. Complete the sensory experience by sampling early-modern food.

Transportation 乗り物

The first railway in Japan opened in the Meiji period. You can ride steam locomotives and trams (Streetcars of Kyoto) that were running at that time (charged).

Steam Locomotives (SL)



Ride a train pulled by the oldest class of steam locomotive still in service in Japan, witness the black smoke, and get a feel for Meiji

Ride the Streetcars of Kyoto, the tram service with the longest history in Japan

Wearing a Meiji-period kimono and hakama, you slip back in time. Quantity and sizes are limited: first come, first served.

For promenade (charged)

Enjoy walking around the village. Available for 20 visitors each day: first come, first served.

For photo (charged)

Easily capture a moment in time. Wearing time limited to only 5 minutes, no time extension. No eating or drinking in costume; no strolling through the village. Enjoy taking photos with your own camera.
